BROWNIES

Reports from Melinda Lottering: Adult Leader 1st Bergyliet.

During the month of June, 1st Bergvliet Brownie Pack worked on the Girlguiding Midlands Celebrate! At Home badge. Our assistant Margaret offered to sponsor the badge for us and we will be receiving them later in the year once international travel resumes.

The Brownies had to complete 7 clauses in the month and these ranged from making an unusual container for popcorn, making juggling balls and learning how to juggle, making a marble run, making a new game out of board games they have at home eg chess-draughts, sharing their music playlist, learning a new dance routine, making a lava lamp, teddy bear ziplining, learning to greet in another language, making a poster to thank essential workers, making homemade musical instruments and holding a concert. The final two clauses that they could choose was themed around the 10 counties that make up the English Midlands and could be Shrewsbury Biscuits from Shropshire, a piece of jewelry or a paper airplane from Birmingham, a paper chain or a decorated glass jar from West Mercia, apple printing from Herefordshire or creative salt

dough pottery art from Staffordshire, amongst others. Every 5 days for the month of June a new task came out and the girls had to choose one out of the six options and two out of the counties.



On Friday the 31st of July and 1st of August 2020, 14 girls from 1st Bergvliet Brownie Pack attended their first virtual camp via Zoom. I have a number of new Brownies who have never been on Pack Holiday before so I wanted to take them back-to-basics to show them what they can expect on a Pack holiday, remind those who are experienced campers about all the fun they had on past camps and to experiment with the virtual format and see what works and what doesn't and finally, earn an Interest Badge together if possible.

I held four sessions, three being on the Friday afternoon and evening and the final session on Saturday morning. Session one was all about Games because that is what we do very well at Brownies. We played "Pass the Pencil" where each person passes a pencil across the screen to the person next to, above or below them and says their name. After that we balanced the pencil on our heads seeing who could do it for the longest, and then stood and sat with the pencil on our head. Our second game required the girls draw a cat in a boat with their eyes closed. I reminded them that Brownies are truthful and not to peek and we had very funny drawings of strange looking cats and boats. Our final game was a Scavenger hunt where they had to look for things around the house that spelt B.R.O.W.N.I.E. and put it on their scarf. We had three elephants, four oranges and lots of nuts on camp.

Our second session was all about S'mores. First we watched a short video of New Zealand Girl Guides making S'mores over the fire, and then we made our own in the microwave. For a few of the girls it was their first-ever experience of S'mores. There were quite a few siblings who joined in this session and even parents who wanted their own tasty treats. While we were eating I went through the practicalities of a mess kit for future camps.

The final session on Friday was a campfire and the parents had printed out the songsheet that I emailed to them earlier. From a rousing "Shosholoza", the evergreen "Bumblebee" to the brand new "Oh I wish I were a...." the Brownies had fun and sang heartily. I also used this session to talk about camp blankets and show some examples of how to make one.


On Saturday the Brownies worked on the retired Friendship Interest Badge and we learnt about the Ndebele culture and coloured in a picture of a nicely decorated house. We chatted about our National Emblems and the Lady of Good Hope and I showed them a photo of the statue at the Castle of Good Hope.

The Brownies final activity was to build a blanket fort for themselves or their teddy and take a picture, which was then uploaded onto our Facebook page for voting. The fort with the highest "likes" after 46 hours was the winner and the Brownie walked away with 5 camp blanket badges to start her collection.

The Brownies had a blast, and even the parents and siblings enjoyed the camp and the comments were very positive. All that was required was 5 photocopies, and the ingredients for the S'mores and internet access. I made a little camp blanket badge for the girls with scrap material and fabric paint that I had at home, so the camp cost was negligible. All work went into their Brownie Scrapbook and now everyone has gained another Interest Badge, which was great.

News from abroad



Jean Lewis, from Cape Town Trefoil Guild, South Africa, informed us about the good turn, they participated in, during this Corona pandemic. Some Trefoil Guilders in South Africa are members of ISGF via Central Branch.

Jean said that on July 21 it was already 117 days of lockdown. Wearing masks outside the house is mandatory. No tobacco products have been allowed to be sold since the lockdown, also alcohol was banned.

In June alcohol was unbanned but sold only from Monday to Thursday. But as this caused so much violence and problems, it was re-banned in early July.





Trefoil Guild contributed to Cape West's Region a total of 1424 Hope jars, which were donated to many different charities in the Western Cape. The Hope jars project was a Girl Guide South Africa project, as this year they are celebrating 110 years of Girl Guides. So, each Region was asked to fill 110 jars. Cape West far surpassed that amount. The contents of each jar was rice, lentils, soup mix (lentils), soup powder, soya mince, and a stock cube. To this the recipients were to add 2,5 litres of water. This then made a hearty meal for 4 people. There were more contents than jars, so these were

also handed to various folk. Many people in the Western Cape had a hot meal, which I'm sure was well received.

I received my Aspley Guild white shirt too.... I will take a picture of me in my new uniform next month.




